Dear colleagues,

We are writing to update you on a change to technology as we approach the Fall term: the University of Toronto is ending its contract with TurnItIn and will be shifting to a new plagiarism detection tool, *Ouriginal*, beginning September 1, 2021.

Instructors who have been using TurnItIn have been contacted directly by Academic & Collaborative Technologies. We recognize that this change is coming at a very challenging time for planning purposes. The University will be following up with Procurement Services to underscore that any future changes to teaching-related technologies should take place well before August.

The University has been <u>recommending more generic syllabus language</u> for plagiarism detection in anticipation of the change to TurnItIn usage. It is crucial to note as well that **there will be little impact on the interface that instructors and students use for submitting assignments**. This has been managed via Quercus since 2017. Any syllabus language that still directly references TurnItIn, however, should be updated for Fall courses, and faculty should no longer use TurnItIn for assignment submissions. Any existing or new assignments in Quercus course shells should be set up to link to *Ouriginal*: <u>https://act.utoronto.ca/pdt-change/</u>

Assignments that were previously submitted to TurnItIn have been loaded into *Ouriginal* to ensure that students may not re-submit previously used course material.
