Orange Shirt Beading Workshop #1

Event Description:

This **in-person, hands-on** orange shirt beading workshop's purpose is to offer the U of T Scarborough community an opportunity for Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples to have healthy conversations about the Indian Residential School system in Canada. All people are welcome and no previous experience is necessary.

In this workshop, participants will learn about the practice/tradition of beading, and they will also hear stories of Indigenous peoples as they bead. We will discuss the origins of the orange shirt story, which started when Phyllis (Jack) Webstad was six years old, and was taken to residential school in an orange shirt. That orange shirt got taken away from her, along with her hair, language, culture, community, and rights. Her story has grown into a commemoration project and reunion event for residential school survivors. Orange Shirt Day is now recognized as a federal statutory holiday. This workshop honours the purpose of the day, and promotes shared conversations in the spirit of reconciliation.

The workshop is limited to 25 participants and is two hours long. It is facilitated by Indigenous students from U of T Scarborough. Participants will be provided with all the materials and instruction to create a beaded pin of an orange shirt that they can keep.

Accessibility: This workshop is not accessible to some people with visual impairments. Participants must have use of their hands/fingers as some fine motor skills are required for beading. This activity takes place while seated.
