Description

This course is offered as an overview of communication disorders for students with previous course work in psychology and linguistics. It gives you the opportunity to pursue both clinical and theoretical interests in this field, and will be of particular interest to those considering a career in speech-language pathology.

Readings and lectures will follow the order of the chapters. You must read the assigned chapters in order to prepare for the final exam, and discussing any questions you might have either in class or via e-mail. Exam questions will be drawn from all of these information sources.

For the class presentation (30 minutes) and the written assignment (10-20 pages), you will choose a narrowly-defined topic, find at least six recent articles (mainly experimental in nature) in journals or books, and write a critical review in which you explain and evaluate the theories and research results. You will find more information on this project in a later handout.

You are required to have an e-mail account in order to complete the first assignment and participate in electronic class discussions.

E-MAIL ASSIGNMENT: DUE JAN. 29

The first assignment involves reading Chapters 1, 2 and 4 and answering the three questions below. If you do not follow the instructions your assignment will not be graded:

- 1. Each answer should be approximately one typed page in length (1 page = 1 single spaced, 8.5×11 inch sheet in a 12 point font with 1 inch margins). The total length should be no more than four typed pages.
- 2. In each case you will be graded on the content, coherence, and thoughtfulness of your reply. Clear and compact writing is essential.
- 3. You may submit the three answers either all at once, or in more than one mailing. If you choose separate mailings you must indicate in the subject line which question you are sending.
- 4. Your work must be submitted as an immediately readable e-mail message. **DO NOT** send text that is formatted for a particular word processor, since there is no guarantee that the computer on which I read your assignment will have that word processor. There are two ways to do this:
 - i) Type your assignment directly into an e-mail message. Warning: If there is a computer failure and the message is lost before you send it, you will have to start again.
 - ii) Type your message using a word processor that is also on the e-mail computer, then paste the work into an e-mail message, as follows:
 - a) Save the file as TEXT ONLY.
 - b) Then SELECT ALL and COPY. This puts the work in the computer's memory buffer.
 - c) QUIT. If you are asked SAVE LARGE CLIPBOARD? (or a similar request), answer YES to ensure the work remains in the buffer.
 - d) Begin an e-mail message, using the address
 - PLID55-SMYTH@SCAR.UTORONTO.CA. Type PLID55 ASSIGNMENT as the subject line; include the question number(s) if you are not submitting the entire assignment.
 - e) Go the the body of the message and PASTE the material into it.
 - f) Send the message.
