This course will begin with a review of the classical theories of intelligence with a focus on psychometric methods and factor-analytic studies. Following this, we will survey contemporary approaches and the research that they have generated. Next we will critically examine the concept heritability, how it is estimated, and its application to the investigation of individual and group differences found on IQ tests. We will then explore some of the personality, social, economic, and familial factors that predict IQ and academic achievement. Finally, we will examine the notions of genius and creativity.
