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Course description:

Psychology's primarily empirical perspective sometimes complements the justice system's rule-based nature, and sometimes the two disciplines are at odds. This course focuses on the application of psychological theory, methods, and data to various procedures and issues in the justice system, including eyewitness evidence, the detection of deception, jury decision-making, and the treatment of children and other special groups in the system. Past court decisions and classic conflicts between society's desire for control and individuals' rights and freedoms have provided the impetus for much of the research in the psychology-law area and form the backdrop of the course.

Required Text:

Course Requirements:

There will be a mid-term and a final exam, both worth 50% (covering material from both the lectures and the text). The exams are not cumulative.

Exams will consist primarily of multiple-choice with some short-essay questions. Not everything in the text will be reviewed in class - and there will be material we discuss in the lecture that does not appear in the text. You are responsible for <u>all</u> this material. Generally, missed exams will be assigned a grade of zero, unless prior notification is given and/or there are legitimate medical or compassionate circumstances involved.
