Brief Description:

Enrolment in this course is limited to students in the Specialist (Co-op) program in Psychology and Its Applications. Students must have satisfactorily completed the 2 required work terms and associated work term reports. During this course students will undertake library research relating to their work experiences, make classroom presentations and posters, and submit a written paper.

Grading Scheme Details:

Poster: (20%) Due Feb 4, 2010

Your poster should be based on one of your two placements and must be approved by the instructor. Your work-term reports will provide a good starting point for the poster. Selected students currently enrolled in the psych co-op program will be invited to attend.

Presentation (20%) Varied dates

Students will be present a 30 minute review of their chosen area of study. Your presentation should demonstrate a fluent understanding of the topic. It will be of benefit to use your acquired work related experience to provide examples of your applied learning as it relates to the research literature.

Final Paper (40%) Due April 1

Listed below are some guidelines for your final paper which will be discussed in depth during the class:

1. Identify the organization where you had your co-op placement and explain its mission statement.

2. Describe the unit/department where the major portion of your placement occurred and describe the function and operating philosophy or model that this unit employed. Did this philosophy help or hinder the ability of the unit to fulfil its task?

3. Describe your particular philosophy/meta-theory about psychology and behaviour. Back this up with research findings. What does the literature lack that you experienced in a real world working environment.

4. Did your personal approach fit with that of the placement site? If so, how, and if not, why not: How did you deal with a mismatch if there was one or how did your congruence with the workplace enhance your performance?

5. What skill set, specific knowledge or general meta-knowledge did you acquire from your co-op placement?

6. What was the most valuable aspect of your co-op experience? What would you recommend or not recommend about your co-op placement to the next co-op class.

7. What thoughts do you have on the entire co-op experience" Any recommendations for improvement of the program?

8. Add a 2 page critique of a paper you read as part of your work experience.
