Each three-hour exam is comprised of about 100 multiple choice questions, with the Final Exam being NON-CUMULATIVE.

LECTURES/ WEBOPTION:

Developed by Prof. John Bassili (the Chair of the Department of Psychology), the WebOption allows students to view lectures online and offers flexibility and control in the learning process.

Lectures are first videotaped, then digitized and uploaded to the Web where they can be accessed by streaming video, enabling students to choose where, when, and how they view the lectures. Once lectures have been posted online they will remain up for the duration of the semester. Lectures will be posted as far ahead in advance as possible, so you can study ahead of schedule if you wish.

The original lectures were held once per week, thus you should watch **AT LEAST ONE LECTURE PER WEEK** to stay on schedule.

Note: students must be physically present at UTSC to write both the midterm and final exams.

I try not to rely too much on the textbook in my lectures because I aim to provide information stemming from my expertise that goes beyond the text or other materials you might be able to access on your own. I therefore advise you against attempting to use the textbook as a substitute for the lectures. Lectures are accompanied by PowerPoint slides that highlight each lecture's central points. You can download these slides before coming to class if doing so will help you to take better notes. However, there is more said in class than the points on these slides. I thus advise you against attempting to use the PowerPoint slides as a substitute for the lectures.

COURSE SCHEDULE: Although you should read the assigned chapters for each week in line with what is written below—in order not to fall behind and then have to cram for the exams—some topics will be presented in more detail than others in class and will thus sometimes continue into a subsequent lecture. There may be some slight changes made to the schedule; any such changes will be discussed ahead of time in class and stated on Blackboard.

Please note that these lectures were originally taped during a regular term that had the Midterm scheduled during lecture time. As a result, there are only 11 lectures. As alluded to above, your Midterm Exam date will be posted once it is arranged.
