Exams will have multiple-choice and short-answer questions. The final exam will be cumulative. Material on the exams will include lecture material and text readings. Although the topics covered will overlap, different things may be emphasized in class than in the book. Therefore, I recommend listening to the lectures. The text is intended to reinforce and supplement material presented in class. That is, for exams all lecture content is fair game. Things mentioned in class can be asked for in the exams – even if they aren't mentioned in the textbook. Topics mentioned in the textbook but not in class won't be on the exams.

Missing a mid-term exam: If you miss one of the two mid-term exams you will need to submit documentation for your reason within 5 workdays. To find out what reasons are accepted and what form of documentation is required, please refer to the student calendar or talk to me. One example, if you are sick you will need a medical note (see UTSC webpages for the form), and you need to bring a physical copy to my office. The form needs to be completed by a medical doctor on the day of the exam that you are missing. A medical note by an acupuncture specialist or a nurse won't be accepted.

If your documentation is OK, you will be able to make up for the missed exam. Make-up exams will be held  $\sim$  1week after that respective mid-term. The make-up exams will be short answer questions only. If you miss one make-up exam, the other mid-term and the final will be re-weighted, 43% and 57%, respectively. If you miss both make-up exams I will arrange for a formal oral exam with me and one of the TAs. For any scheduled exam that you miss please be sure to provide me with documentation as mentioned above. Finally, if you miss the final exam, you are asked to petition to write the test through the Registrar's office, usually one term later. The deferred final exam will be short answer questions only.

**Difficulties with the course:** *I want you to do well in the course!* Please talk to me if you feel you are having difficulties with the course (or if you have personal issues that might interfere with your performance). The earlier the better. I will try my best and am happy to help. Especially, please come before an exam is to be held. Afterwards is too late. Please note, that as per university policy it is not possible to negotiate better grades. That includes requests for extra course work. There are 3 exams for this course for everyone. I can't offer additional forms of evaluation to a few people without offering them to/requiring them from everyone.
