Evaluation:

- (1) Midterm test and Final exam each worth 1/3 of your grade. There will be 50 multiple choice questions covering the lectures and text. I will try for 25 lecture and 25 text questions but some of my lectures cover text material so that may not be exact.
- (2) In terms of textbook content, the midterm will cover the first half of the textbook: Chapters 1-4 (inclusive). The final exam will cover the second half of the textbook: Chapter 5-10 plus the Conclusion (inclusive).
- (3) I have also prepared and uploaded summaries of material from the textbook and Gardiner's *Feeling and Emotion* that are included in the midterm exam. These are meant to help students understand the first three chapters in the textbook.

I may also assign additional readings and have students view videos from my series on the *Aesthetics of Emotion* (http://uoft.me/aestheticsofemotion)

(4) Twenty page term paper worth 1/3 of your grade on a topic related to emotion. The format will be discussed in class.

Your final grade is based on: Midterm (1/3), Final Exam (1/3), and Paper (1/3).

Goals of the course:

The course offers an overview of ideas related to the psychology of emotion.

- a. The philosophical contributions of the ancient Greeks and Medieval thinkers.
- b. The emergence of a secular (i.e., non-religious) approach to emotion theory during the Renaissance (16th century).
- c. An examination of the ideas of British Enlightenment philosophers of the 18th century who paved the way for behavioural-cognitivism and Action models of emotion.
- d. An examination of German Romantic philosophers of the 19th century whose ideas shaped the psychodynamic, Gestalt, and phenomenological approaches to Reaction models of emotion.

- d. A proposal for a unified model of emotion called *Emotional Phase* Theory based on the distinction between emotions, feelings, affects, and appetitive needs.
- e. An examination of how emotion both shapes and is shaped by the Age of Electronic Transmission.
- f. An examination of how emotions and feelings influence our aesthetic and media preferences.

Missed Term Work due to Medical Illness or Emergency:
